

# Expat Insider 2018 Reveals: Expats in Australia Feel Welcome Again

Australia recovers from a dip in last year's survey, thanks to improvements in quality of life, ease of settling in, and working life.

- Australia ranks 12th out of 68 countries in the Expat Insider 2018 survey. The top 10 destinations for expats are Bahrain, Taiwan, Ecuador, Mexico, Singapore, Portugal, Costa Rica, Spain, Colombia, and Czechia.
- More than three-quarters of the expats in Australia (76%) consider the attitude of the Australian population towards foreign residents friendly in 2018, compared to 67 percent in 2017.
- Close to half the expats in Australia (46%) say their disposable household income is more than enough to cover daily living expenses, which is below the global average (51%), but above 2017's share (31%).
- Australian expats are about five years older than the global average (49.0 years vs. 44.2 years globally).

Munich, 6 September 2018 — After ranking among the top 10 countries for expats from 2014 to 2016, Australia plummeted to 34th rank in 2017: now the land down under is back up, coming in 12th place out of 68 countries in the Expat Insider 2018 survey. Expats in Australia enjoy a better-than-ever quality of life and feel welcome in their new home again. However, many still struggle with the high cost of living and their personal finances, as the Expat Insider 2018 survey reveals. With more than 18,000 respondents living and working abroad, it is one of the most extensive expat studies, conducted annually by InterNations, the largest expat community worldwide. Apart from offering an in-depth analysis of life abroad, the survey ranks 68 countries by a variety of factors such as quality of life, working abroad, and settling in. While Australia narrowly misses being featured among the ten bestrated countries, this year's top 10 destinations for expats are Bahrain, Taiwan, Ecuador, Mexico, Singapore, Portugal, Costa Rica, Spain, Colombia, and Czechia.

# **High Quality of Life and a Welcoming Population**

Australia is back on track in terms of quality of life, moving up 15 ranks since last year (from 23rd to 8th). In fact, more than nine in ten expats (94%) are happy with the quality of the environment (vs. 88% in 2017), and 90 percent are satisfied with the available leisure activities (vs. 75% globally). Both these shares are far above the global average in 2018 (69% and 78%, respectively).

Additionally, the new Digital Life subcategory also helps Australia to climb up the ranks: 83 percent of expats are happy with the availability of government services online (vs. 55% globally), and nearly everyone (95%) finds it easy to pay without cash (vs. 78% globally). Only the access to high-speed internet at home seems to be problematic, with 23 percent of expats in Australia rating it negatively, compared to 16 percent globally.

Moreover, expats seem to find it easier to settle in, with Australia gaining twelve ranks within the last year (from 31st to 19th). More than three-quarters (76%) now rate the attitude of the Australian population towards foreign residents positively, which is nine percentage points more than in 2017 (67%). This year, nearly one in three expats (32%) even give it the best possible rating (vs. 24% in 2017). "I am astonished by the people, their kindness, and the welcoming and laid-back attitude," an expat from France shares. In fact, 55 percent of expats find it easy to make local friends in Australia, which is twelve percentage points more than in 2017 (43%).

## **Expats Have More Time and More Money**

After ranking a low 32nd in 2017, Australia has also improved in terms of working life, coming in 13th out of 68 countries this year. Two-thirds of expats (66%) are happy with their career prospects, compared to just 54 percent in 2017. The latest result is eleven percentage points more than the global average in 2018 (55%). Additionally, close to three in four expats (74%) rate their working hours favorably, which is 14 percentage points more than in 2017 (60%). What is more, seven in ten (70%) are satisfied with their work-life balance, compared to 63 percent in 2017. A Dutch expat is happy that "work-life balance is respected in Australia".

Despite improving by 22 positions in terms of personal finance (from 62nd in 2017 to 40th in 2018), Australia still lands in the lower half of this ranking. On the one hand, 46 percent of expats state that their disposable household income is more than enough to cover their living expenses, which is 15 percentage points more than in 2017 (31%). On the other hand, this is still below the global average of 51 percent. "It is so expensive here," a British expat comments, while an expat from Taiwan thinks that "Australia is a great place to live as long as you are rich". Interestingly, 15 percent of expats in Australia have a gross yearly household income of more than 150,000 USD, which is not only slightly above the global average (12%), but also above last year's share (11%). Maybe this is one reason why just 14 percent rate their financial situation negatively in 2018 (vs. 31% in 2017).

## **Australians Abroad: Older Expats Seeking an Adventure**

With an average age of 49 years, Australian expats are almost five years older than the average expat (44.2 years). When asked why they moved abroad (multiple answers possible), 29 percent stated that they were looking for an adventure or a personal challenge, which is the most cited reason (vs. 24%).



globally). In fact, it seems like the Australians respondents have a particularly strong sense of wanderlust: 38 percent have lived in three or more foreign countries before, compared to 29 percent globally. "I like the opportunity to see more of a country, which I have always wanted to experience," an Australian expat in Italy says, while another respondent in Luxembourg appreciates that "it is very central, which makes it ideal for traveling".

Interestingly, their sense of adventure only seems to be temporary: 62 percent consider it likely to return to Australia at some point (vs. 43% globally). Close to half (48%) even think it very likely, which is 17 percentage points more than the global average (31%). "Belgium is so far from home," an Australian expat bemoans, and one in Romania admits to being "homesick for my own country".


## Top 3 Countries for Expats Are Great for Working Abroad and Easy to Settle In

2017's surprise winner **Bahrain** defends its first place, thanks to excellent results for working abroad and ease of settling in (1st for both). Seven in ten expats in Bahrain (70%) are happy with their career prospects (vs. 55% globally), and 81 percent find it easy to settle down in this country (vs. 59% globally). "I do not feel like an expat in Bahrain," says an Indian respondent. "I feel at home here". More than threequarters of the expats living in runner-up **Taiwan** (76%) are satisfied with their job security (vs. 59%) globally), with the destination ranking first in the world for this factor. Taiwan also offers the world's highest quality of life, and 77 percent of expats feel at home there (vs. 64% globally). Coming in third place, **Ecuador** is one the biggest winners of the *Expat Insider 2018* survey, moving up 22 ranks since 2017 (25th out of 65). While less than half the expats in Ecuador (46%) were satisfied with their career prospects in 2017, 69 percent are happy now. Moreover, 76 percent find it easy to settle down in this Latin American country (vs. 59% globally).

### **Bottom 3 Countries for Expats Rank Low for Quality of Life**

India (66th), Saudi Arabia (67th), and Kuwait (68th) do not only rank at the bottom of the overall league table, but they are also among the worst destinations in terms quality of life. Expats in India are dealing with the world's lowest quality of the environment: more than four in five (82%) are unhappy with this factor (vs. 19% globally). Over two in five (41%) even give it the worst possible rating, which is more than ten times the global average (4%). "I do not like the quality of the air, all the trash, and the pollution," an expat from the USA says. "It is very dirty all over the country". Around half the expats in **Kuwait** (52%) and **Saudi Arabia** (47%) are also unhappy with this factor. Moreover, the two Gulf States rank last and second to last for the ease of settling in. About half the expats in Kuwait (47%) and Saudi Arabia (51%) find it hard to get used to the local culture, compared to 21 percent globally.



#### About the InterNations *Expat Insider 2018* Survey

For its annual *Expat Insider* survey, InterNations asked more than 18,000 expatriates representing 178 nationalities and living in 187 countries or territories to provide information on various aspects of expat life, as well as their gender, age, and nationality. Participants were asked to rate up to 48 different aspects of life abroad on a scale of one to seven. The rating process emphasized the respondents' personal satisfaction with these aspects and considered both emotional topics as well as more factual aspects with equal weight. The respondents' ratings of the individual factors were then bundled in various combinations for a total of 17 subcategories, and their mean values were used to draw up six topical indices: Quality of Life, Ease of Settling In, Working Abroad, Family Life, Personal Finance, and Cost of Living Index. Except for the latter, all indices were further averaged in order to rank 68 expatriate destinations around the world. In 2018, the top 10 are Bahrain, Taiwan, Ecuador, Mexico, Singapore, Portugal, Costa Rica, Spain, Colombia, and Czechia.

For a country to be featured in the indices and consequently in the overall ranking, a sample size of at least 75 survey participants per country was necessary. The only exception to this is the Family Life Index, where a sample size of at least 40 respondents raising children abroad was required. In 2018, 68 and 50 countries respectively met these requirements. However, in most countries the sample size exceeded 100 participants.
