

# Expat Insider 2018 Survey Reveals: Expats Give Qatar Its Best Ranking So Far

With Qatar having improved 20 ranks overall since last year, expats are more satisfied with the quality of life, the ease of settling in, and family life abroad.

- Bahrain leads the list of the best destinations for expats, followed by Taiwan, Ecuador, Mexico, Singapore, Portugal, Costa Rica, Colombia, and Czechia.
- Kuwait (68th) and Saudi Arabia (67th) are rated the worst expat destinations worldwide, together with India, Brazil, Turkey, Egypt, Peru, Italy, Greece, and the United Kingdom.
- While Qatar (from 58th to 38th) has gained in popularity among expats, Oman (from 17th to 31st) and the UAE (from 26th to 40th) are losing ground.
- While Bahrain (12th) ranks fairly high for its digital infrastructure, all other Gulf States lag behind: the restricted access to online services such as social media is an issue throughout the region.

Munich, 6 September 2018 — The Gulf States are home to the best expat destination in the world, but also to some of the worst-rated ones: Bahrain ranks at the very top of the *Expat Insider* survey for the second year, thanks to great results for working abroad and the ease of settling in. It is followed — at a considerable distance — by Oman (31st), which has lost 14 ranks since last year (17th). Qatar (38th), which has moved up 20 ranks since 2017 (58th), as well as the UAE (40th), which has dropped 14 positions (26th), rank in the middle of the league table. At the bottom of the list, Saudi Arabia (67th) and Kuwait (68th) keep disappointing expats year after year, as the *Expat Insider 2018* survey reveals. With more than 18,000 respondents living and working abroad, it is one of the most extensive expat studies, conducted annually by *InterNations*, the largest expat community worldwide. Apart from offering an in-depth analysis of life abroad, the survey ranks 68 countries by a variety of factors such as quality of life, working abroad, and settling in. While results across the Gulf States vary strongly, Bahrain is this year's winner, followed by Taiwan, Ecuador, Mexico, Singapore, Portugal, Costa Rica, Spain, Colombia, and Czechia.

# **Expats in Qatar Appreciate the Peacefulness and Safety**

Ranking 38th out of 68 countries in the Expat Insider 2018 survey, Qatar has moved up 20 places since 2017 (58th) and achieves its best result ever. On a global scale, the country still shows an average performance at best; however, it does receive its best ratings ever for quality of life (42nd), ease of settling in (41st), and family life (27th out of 50).

Expats in Qatar are more satisfied than ever with their socializing options and the available leisure activities: while just 44 percent rated this factor positively in 2017, 61 percent are happy with it in 2018. Moreover, expats find life in Qatar very safe and peaceful. Nearly all expats (96%) are satisfied with their personal safety, compared to 82 percent globally, and three-quarters (75%) could not feel any safer in their new country of residence (vs. 48% globally). Similarly, 89 percent describe Qatar as peaceful, which is eleven percentage points more than the global average (78%). "It is very safe to live in this country," says an expat from the Philippines.

Qatar also does quite well in the new Digital Life subcategory, ranking 28th out of 68 countries. Expats are particularly happy with the availability of government services online (79% satisfied vs. 55% globally). However, the restricted access to other online services such as social media is a sore point: more than one quarter (26%) are unhappy with this factor, compared to ten percent globally.

#### **Welcoming Locals Make for Great Family Life**

It seems as if it is getting slightly easier for expats to settle down in Qatar, with the destination having moved up six ranks since last year (from 47th to 41st). In fact, expats do feel more welcome in Qatar as 62 percent rate the attitude of the local population towards foreign residents positively in 2018, compared to just 51 percent in 2017. Moreover, just 46 percent of expats found it easy to make new

friends in Qatar in 2017, which was below last year's global average (58%) — in 2018, 61 percent find this easy, which is slightly above the global average in 2018 (57%).

Family life in Qatar is also ranked more positively by expats, with the country coming in 27th place out of 50 destinations — compared to 37th place in 2017. For example, expat parents in Qatar consider the attitude towards families with children generally friendly (19th out of 50). In fact, close to nine in ten (88%) rate this factor positively, compared to a global average of 83 percent. What is more, expat parents are also impressed with the quality of education, which has climbed from ranking 26th in 2017 to 14th in 2018. More than three-quarters (76%) rate the quality of education in Qatar positively, an increase of seven-percentage points-since 2017 (69%).

#### Top 3 Countries for Expats Are Great for Working Abroad and Easy to Settle In

2017's surprise winner **Bahrain** defends its first place, thanks to excellent results for working abroad and ease of settling in (1st for both). Seven in ten expats in Bahrain (70%) are happy with their career prospects (vs. 55% globally), and 81 percent find it easy to settle down in this country (vs. 59% globally).




"I do not feel like an expat in Bahrain," says an Indian respondent. "I feel at home here". More than threequarters of the expats living in runner-up **Taiwan** (76%) are satisfied with their job security (vs. 59% globally), with the destination ranking first in the world for this factor. Taiwan also offers the world's highest quality of life, and 77 percent of expats feel at home there (vs. 64% globally). Coming in third place, **Ecuador** is one the biggest winners of the Expat Insider 2018 survey, moving up 22 ranks since 2017 (25th out of 65). While less than half the expats in Ecuador (46%) were satisfied with their career prospects in 2017, 69 percent are happy now. Moreover, 76 percent find it easy to settle down in this Latin American country (vs. 59% globally).

# **Bottom 3 Countries for Expats Rank Low for Quality of Life**

India (66th), Saudi Arabia (67th), and Kuwait (68th) do not only rank at the bottom of the overall league table, but they are also among the worst destinations in terms quality of life. Expats in India are dealing with the world's lowest quality of the environment: more than four in five (82%) are unhappy with this factor (vs. 19% globally). Over two in five (41%) even give it the worst possible rating, which is more than ten times the global average (4%). "I do not like the quality of the air, all the trash, and the pollution," an expat from the USA says. "It is very dirty all over the country". Around half the expats in Kuwait (52%) and Saudi Arabia (47%) are also unhappy with this factor. Moreover, the two Gulf States rank last and second to last for the ease of settling in. About half the expats in Kuwait (47%) and Saudi Arabia (51%) find it hard to get used to the local culture, compared to 21 percent globally.

## About the InterNations *Expat Insider 2018* Survey

For its annual *Expat Insider* survey, InterNations asked more than 18,000 expatriates representing 178 nationalities and living in 187 countries or territories to provide information on various aspects of expat life, as well as their gender, age, and nationality. Participants were asked to rate up to 48 different aspects of life abroad on a scale of one to seven. The rating process emphasized the respondents' personal satisfaction with these aspects and considered both emotional topics as well as more factual aspects with equal weight. The respondents' ratings of the individual factors were then bundled in various combinations for a total of 17 subcategories, and their mean values were used to draw up six topical indices: Quality of Life, Ease of Settling In, Working Abroad, Family Life, Personal Finance, and Cost of Living Index. Except for the latter, all indices were further averaged in order to rank 68 expatriate destinations around the world. In 2018, the top 10 are Bahrain, Taiwan, Ecuador, Mexico, Singapore, Portugal, Costa Rica, Spain, Colombia, and Czechia.

For a country to be featured in the indices and consequently in the overall ranking, a sample size of at least 75 survey participants per country was necessary. The only exception to this is the Family Life Index, where a sample size of at least 40 respondents raising children abroad was required. In 2018, 68 and 50 countries respectively met these requirements. However, in most countries the sample size exceeded 100 participants.
