

Expat Insider 2018 Survey Reveals: Expats in Argentina Are Not Happy with Their Financial Situation

While expats find it hard to make ends meet, they do not have any issues finding local friends.

- Ecuador (3rd), Mexico (4th), Costa Rica (7th), and Colombia (9th) rank in the top 10 destinations of the Expat Insider 2018 survey, together with Bahrain (1st), Taiwan (2nd), Singapore (5th), Portugal (6th), Spain (8th), and Czechia (10th).
- The results for Panama (13th), Chile (33rd), and Argentina (58th) are rather mixed, while Peru (62nd) and Brazil (65th) feature among the bottom 10 countries.

Munich, 6 September 2018 — Latin America is home to some of the best-ranking expat destinations across the globe, but also to some of the worst-rated ones. Ecuador (3rd) has recovered from last year's drop to 25th place, followed by Mexico (4th), which remains ever popular among expats. Costa Rica (7th) has lost five ranks since 2017 (2nd) but maintains its place in the top 10, together with Colombia (9th). Panama (13th) narrowly misses the top 10 ranking, while Chile (33th) gives a rather lackluster performance. At the bottom of the list, Argentina (58th), Peru (62nd), and Brazil (65th) turn out to be disappointing destinations, as the *Expat Insider 2018* survey reveals. With more than 18,000 respondents living and working abroad, it is one of the most extensive expat studies, conducted annually by InterNations, the largest expat community worldwide. Apart from offering an in-depth analysis of life abroad, the survey ranks 68 countries by a variety of factors such as quality of life, working abroad, and settling in. While results across Latin America vary strongly, this year's top 10 destinations for expats are Bahrain, Taiwan, Ecuador, Mexico, Singapore, Portugal, Costa Rica, Spain, Colombia, and Czechia.

Expats Move to Argentina for Love and End Up Concerned about Work and Money

Ranking 58th out of 68 countries worldwide, Argentina narrowly escapes being listed among the ten worst-rated destinations for expats. The country ranks particularly low for working life (62nd) and personal finances (66th), beating only Italy and Greece with regard to the latter. In fact, over three in ten expats (31%) in Argentina are not satisfied with their financial situation (vs. 17% globally). The cost of living is apparently a major issue as three in five (60%) rate this factor negatively, which is almost twice the global average (31%). *"I have never had any surplus income that allows me to live as I would like to,"* says an expat from the US. *"I — and almost everybody I know — have more than one job to make ends meet"*. Working expats are not satisfied with their career prospects (31% vs. 25% globally), and Argentina is one of the worst-rated countries in Latin America when it comes to overall job satisfaction (24% negative ratings vs. 18% globally).

Considering the respondents' low satisfaction with their working life in Argentina, it is no surprise that just 19 percent of expats have moved there for work-related reasons (vs. 31% globally). The main reason why expats relocate to Argentina is love: close to one quarter (24%) name this as their most important motivation for moving (vs. 12% globally). While over two out of five expats in general (43%) are in a relationship with a partner who has the same nationality, the majority of expats in Argentina (54%) has a partner from their new country of residence.

Maybe it is thanks to their local partners that expats find it easy to make friends in Argentina: more than two-thirds (68%) agree that they have had no trouble difficulty in becoming friends with local residents (vs. 45% globally). Another 43 percent of respondents even say they are mainly friends with locals, which is 24 percentage points more than the global average (19%) and one of the highest shares in Latin America, second only to Brazil (47%). Available socializing and leisure activities might have also helped expats to bond with local residents: almost three-quarters (73%) are satisfied with this aspect of life abroad (vs. 66% globally), and 28 percent even could not be any happier (vs. 22% globally).

Top 3 Countries for Expats Are Great for Working Abroad and Easy to Settle In

2017's surprise winner **Bahrain** defends its first place, thanks to excellent results for working abroad and ease of settling in (1st for both). Seven in ten expats in Bahrain (70%) are happy with their career prospects (vs. 55% globally), and 81 percent find it easy to settle down in this country (vs. 59% globally). *"I do not feel like an expat in Bahrain,"* says an Indian respondent. *"I feel at home here"*. More than threequarters of the expats living in runner-up **Taiwan** (76%) are satisfied with their job security (vs. 59% globally), with the destination ranking first in the world for this factor. Taiwan also offers the world's highest quality of life, and 77 percent of expats feel at home there (vs. 64% globally). Coming in third place, **Ecuador** is one the biggest winners of the *Expat Insider 2018* survey, moving up 22 ranks since 2017 (25th out of 65). While less than half the expats in Ecuador (46%) were satisfied with their career prospects in 2017, 69 percent are happy now. Moreover, 76 percent find it easy to settle down in this Latin American country (vs. 59% globally).

Bottom 3 Countries for Expats Rank Low for Quality of Life

India (66th), Saudi Arabia (67th), and Kuwait (68th) do not only rank at the bottom of the overall league table, but they are also among the worst destinations in terms quality of life. Expats in **India** are dealing with the world's lowest quality of the environment: more than four in five (82%) are unhappy with this factor (vs. 19% globally). Over two in five (41%) even give it the worst possible rating, which is more than ten times the global average (4%). *"I do not like the quality of the air, all the trash, and the pollution,"* an expat from the USA says. *"It is very dirty all over the country"*. Around half the expats in



Kuwait (52%) and **Saudi Arabia** (47%) are also unhappy with this factor. Moreover, the two Gulf States rank last and second to last for the ease of settling in. About half the expats in Kuwait (47%) and Saudi Arabia (51%) find it hard to get used to the local culture, compared to 21 percent globally.



About the InterNations Expat Insider 2018 Survey

For its annual *Expat Insider* survey, InterNations asked more than 18,000 expatriates representing 178 nationalities and living in 187 countries or territories to provide information on various aspects of expat life, as well as their gender, age, and nationality. Participants were asked to rate up to 48 different aspects of life abroad on a scale of one to seven. The rating process emphasized the respondents' personal satisfaction with these aspects and considered both emotional topics as well as more factual aspects with equal weight. The respondents' ratings of the individual factors were then bundled in various combinations for a total of 17 subcategories, and their mean values were used to draw up six topical indices: Quality of Life, Ease of Settling In, Working Abroad, Family Life, Personal Finance, and Cost of Living Index. Except for the latter, all indices were further averaged in order to rank 68 expatriate destinations around the world. In 2018, the top 10 are Bahrain, Taiwan, Ecuador, Mexico, Singapore, Portugal, Costa Rica, Spain, Colombia, and Czechia.



For a country to be featured in the indices and consequently in the overall ranking, a sample size of at least 75 survey participants per country was necessary. The only exception to this is the Family Life Index, where a sample size of at least 40 respondents raising children abroad was required. In 2018, 68 and 50 countries respectively met these requirements. However, in most countries the sample size exceeded 100 participants.
